
GUN DEATHS IN BIG CITIES: 2010-2021

GUN DEATHS ROSE BY 65% IN BIG CITIES OVER THE PAST DECADE, WITH A STEEP RISE AT THE HEIGHT OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC




HIGHER GUN DEATH RATES AND STEEPER INCREASES OCCURRED IN CITIES WITH HIGHER RATES OF:

- POVERTY
- UNEMPLOYMENT
- RACIAL SEGREGATION

GUN VIOLENCE HAS DISPROPORTIONATELY CLAIMED THE LIVES OF BLACK PEOPLE

In 2021, the risk of gun death was **4x higher** for Black people compared to white people. Most gun deaths among Black and Hispanic people were homicide. Most gun deaths for white and AAPI people were attributed to suicide.
