
TAKE THE CENTER STAGE



THE APPLICATION PROCESS

First-year application deadlines

At Drexel, we carefully consider every application. The members of our Admissions Committee use a holistic review process to assess all aspects of the application personally. We believe it's important to enroll right-fit students.

Early Decision November 1

Early Decision is the perfect option for students who know Drexel is the school for them and would like a decision in December of their senior year. This is a binding application plan and, if admitted, students must withdraw all other active applications and commit to enrolling at Drexel.

Early Action...... November 1

Like Early Decision, Early Action allows students to receive an admission decision in December of their senior year. Early Action admission is not binding and, if admitted, students have until May 1 to submit an enrollment deposit.

Regular DecisionJanuary 15

Through the Regular Decision application process, students will receive a decision in early spring and have until May 1 to submit an enrollment deposit.

Winter Entry ProgramOctober 1

The Winter Entry Program is an admission plan that offers first-year students the chance to start their enrollment during Drexel's winter quarter in January.

First-year student applications can be submitted via the Common Application or the Coalition Application.

Standardized test scores

For the majority of majors and programs, first-year students applying for fall 2024 and the Winter Entry Program can choose to do so under our Test-Optional policy, which allows students to choose whether to include standardized test scores as part of their application. Non-native English speakers may be required to submit an approved English proficiency exam.

Transfer application deadlines

There are many reasons you may consider transferring to Drexel, and as you make your transition, we'll be here to help you every step of the way. Drexel has a vibrant and active transfer community, with approximately 500 new students joining us each year. Qualified applicants are considered on a rolling basis through all terms, although it is recommended to apply as early as possible and follow the priority deadlines for the best results. The latest you can apply is one month prior to the start of the term. International applicants are encouraged to apply by the posted deadlines.

Transfer applicants must submit official college transcripts. Those who have completed less than 24 semester credits must submit high school transcripts. Depending on the program you are applying for, additional prerequisites or materials may apply.

All applicants must complete the CSS Profile, and all U.S. citizens and permanent residents must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to be considered for the most available aid.

I Transfer financial aid

Drexel offers competitive financial aid opportunities for transfer applicants. In the 2022-2023 academic year, the average scholarship and grant aid offered to transfer students was \$31.199*, which includes federal, state. and institutional aid. While students will be reviewed for scholarships during the admissions review process, we highly recommend completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible to maximize their eligibility for support; international applicants should submit the CSS Profile to be considered for Drexel need-based aid.

Undergraduate awards

Some of the most common award offerings for first-year and transfer students include:

Drexel Merit Scholarship - Amount varies

Full-time on-campus applicants (except for our seconddegree Nursing program, known as ACE, or those applying for a second bachelor's degree) are automatically considered for these academic performance-based awards.

Phi Theta Kappa Scholarship - \$500 (awarded per term enrolled in full-time coursework)

Offered to Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society members who apply as transfer students to one of our full-time, on-campus programs (ACE students are not eligible).

Drexel Grant - Amount varies

To be eligible to receive this institutional need-based award, all first-year and international transfer applicants are required to submit the CSS Profile, domestic transfer students must submit only the FAFSA.

Federal/State Financial Aid - Amount varies

Applicants are required to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to be considered for federal and state grants, loans, and work-study funding.

The Drexel Promise

All transfer students who have earned an associate degree from an accredited Pennsylvania or New Jersey community college are eligible for a scholarship providing 50% of their tuition cost. Those who qualify are not required to submit a CSS Profile.




First-year 3.81 average high school GPA on a 4.0 scale




