Symbols of Investiture

ACADEMIC DRESS

Academic dress originated with the cap and gown simply worn as the everyday attire of the medieval scholar. In 1895, a common code of academic dress was adopted by colleges and universities in the United States dictating three kinds of gowns and three lengths of hoods for bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees. Three factors must be taken into consideration—the degree; the branch of knowledge; and the university by which the degree is granted.

The design of the gown's sleeves designates the degree granted. Many American universities, as well as British ones, now have gowns of characteristic color for the degree granting institution. The shape and size of the American hood mark the degree of the wearer, the lining of the hood is indicative of the institution granting the degree, and the velvet trim indicates the major field of knowledge.

Caps traditionally have a tassel fastened to the midpoint. A doctoral cap may have a tassel of gold thread.

Drexel University's president wears a doctoral gown, hood and cap in blue with gold.

University Mace

An academic procession is led by a grand marshal / mace bearer carrying a ceremonial mace. The mace traces its origins to the Roman fasces, a bundle of rods bound together around an axe with the blade projecting, which was carried before magistrates as an emblem of authority. For academic institutions, it symbolizes the power of the president or the Board to confer degrees.

Drexel University's mace is gold-plated bronze and brass. The staff is embossed with the official seals of Drexel University and Drexel University College of Medicine. Crowning the staff is a dragon, the University's mascot representing strength, surmounted by a three-sided pyramid made of polished obsidian encircled by three gold bands forming a sphere representing science, art and industry.

PRESIDENTIAL MEDALLION

Academic presidential medallions symbolize the wearer's allegiance to the institution. The chain itself connotes strength in unity. Presidents wear these ornate pieces on ceremonial occasions as part of their regalia.

Drexel University's presidential medallion is pure bronze embossed with the University seal and on the reverse side is engraved the name of the president and the dates of office. The chain is sterling silver with 18 karat gold vermeil plating.

ABOUT JOHN FRY



John Anderson Fry, appointed Drexel University's 14th president in 2010, has served higher education for his entire professional life. Through his roles as a consultant, board member, chief operating officer and chief executive, he has acquired a deep and broad understanding of the challenges of leading a major educational institution.

Fry came to Drexel from Franklin & Marshall College, where he served as president from 2002 and was instrumental in the college's academic growth, campus and neighborhood development and improved finances. He raised the college's national profile and brought a renewed confidence to the institution. During his tenure, the quality of the student body improved dramatically as measured by a 63-point gain in average SATs over seven years. He also improved residential life through the creation of the faculty-led, student-governed College House system. The student-to-faculty ratio was lowered to 10:1, with a commitment made to hire 40 new

tenure-track faculty members. Franklin & Marshall's curriculum was updated and expanded in life sciences, computer science, creative writing and modern languages. Faculty compensation was brought to the median of the college's national competitors. Under his leadership, Franklin & Marshall made a long-term commitment to increase its financial aid to attract and enroll the most highly qualified students. Fry forged new partnerships with the city and neighbors, improving the surrounding business economic district and neighborhoods.

From 1995 to 2002, Fry served as executive vice president of the University of Pennsylvania. He was a major force in developing and implementing Penn's "Agenda for Excellence," a comprehensive plan that guided strategic initiatives from 1996 to 2001. As the university's chief operating officer, he was responsible for finance, investments, human resources, facilities and real estate, public safety, computing, technology transfer, research

administration, corporate relations, auxiliary enterprises and internal audit and compliance. He also served as the university's liaison to the University of Pennsylvania Health System. At Penn, Fry built a coalition of non-profit, business, neighborhood and governmental organizations in support of a multi-pronged strategy to address the key challenges facing the University City neighborhood in West Philadelphia. In a relatively short period of time, residential property values rose significantly, the crime rate declined dramatically and hundreds of millions of dollars were invested in commercial infrastructure and economic development.

Before joining Penn, Fry was a higher education consultant. He worked closely with some of the nation's premier colleges and universities, first with KPMG Peat Marwick and then with Coopers & Lybrand's National Higher Education Consulting Practice, where he was elected a partner in the firm and eventually rose through the ranks to become partner-in-charge of the national practice.

Fry serves on the boards of the Haverford School, Damon Runyon Cancer Research Foundation, Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, the Greater Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, Select Greater Philadelphia, the Schuylkill River Development Corporation and US Squash. He was the founding chairman of the University City District and served in that capacity for five years. He is also a director of Community Health Systems, Delaware Investments and NASDAQ-OMX.

In 2009, Fry completed his second term as chair of the NCAA Division III Presidents Council and stepped down after six years of service on the council. He also served for three years on the Executive Committee of the NCAA. He was appointed by President George W. Bush to serve on the Benjamin Franklin Tercentenary Commission that planned the celebration of Franklin's 300th birthday. Fry also served as a co-chair of the transition team of Governor-Elect Edward Rendell of Pennsylvania.

A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., Fry studied American civilization at Lafayette College and received the *George Wharton Pepper Prize*, the highest honor awarded to a graduating senior. In 1986, he earned a master's degree in business administration from the New York University Stern School of Business.

Fry and his wife, Cara, an art historian, have three children: Mia, a sophomore at Williams College; Nathaniel, a sophomore at The Shipley School; and Phoebe, a fourth grader at The Shipley School.

Honored Speaker: Freeman A. Hrabowski iii

Freeman A. Hrabowski III, has served as President of UMBC (The University of Maryland, Baltimore County) since 1992. His research and publications focus on science and math education, with special emphasis on minority participation and performance. He chaired the National Academies committee that recently produced the report, "Expanding Underrepresented Minority Participation: America's Science and Technology Talent at the Crossroads"

In 2008, he was named one of America's Best Leaders by U.S. News & World Report, which in both 2009 and 2010 ranked UMBC the #1 "Up and Coming" university in the nation and among the top colleges and universities for commitment to undergraduate teaching. In 2009, Time magazine named him one of America's 10 Best College Presidents. In 2011, he received the TIAA-CREF Theodore M. Hesburgh Award for Leadership Excellence,



recognized by many as the nation's highest award among higher education leaders. TIAA-CREF honors those "who demonstrate innovative thinking and a positive impact on both higher education and society."

He serves as a consultant to the National Science Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, the National Academies, and universities and school systems nationally. He also serves on a variety of foundation and corporate boards, including, for example, The Urban Institute, the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, and the Marguerite Casey Foundation (Chair).

Examples of honors include election to the American Academy of Arts & Sciences and the American Philosophical Society; receiving the prestigious McGraw Prize in Education, the U.S. Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics, and Engineering Mentoring, and the Columbia University Teachers College Medal for Distinguished Service; being named a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and Marylander of the Year by the editors of the Baltimore Sun; and being listed among

Fast Company magazine's first Fast 50 Champions of Innovation in business and technology. He also holds honorary degrees from more than 20 institutions – from Harvard and Princeton, Duke and the University of Michigan, to Franklin & Marshall and Harvey Mudd College.

With philanthropist Robert Meyerhoff, he co-founded the Meyerhoff Scholars Program in 1988 for high-achieving minority students committed to pursuing advanced degrees and research careers in science and engineering. The program has become a national model, and based on program outcomes, Hrabowski has authored numerous articles and coauthored two books, *Beating the Odds* and *Overcoming the Odds* (Oxford University Press), focusing on parenting and high-achieving African American males and females in science. Both books are used by universities, school systems, and community groups around the country.

A child-leader in the Civil Rights Movement, Hrabowski was prominently featured in Spike Lee's 1997 documentary, *Four Little Girls*, on the racially motivated bombing in 1963 of Birmingham's Sixteenth Street Baptist Church.

Born in 1950 in Birmingham, Alabama, Hrabowski graduated at 19 from Hampton Institute with highest honors in mathematics. At the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, he received his M.A. (mathematics) and four years later his Ph.D. (higher education administration/statistics) at age 24.



ABOUT DREXEL UNIVERSITY



In the closing decades of the 19th century, Philadelphia financier and philanthropist Anthony J. Drexel envisioned an institution of higher learning uniquely suited to the needs of a rapidly growing industrial society and of the young men and women seeking their place in it.

In 1891, he realized his vision with the establishment of the Drexel Institute of Art, Science and Industry. In founding the Institute, Anthony J. Drexel launched a tradition of innovation, which today is carried on by Drexel University.

Although distinguished by decades of growth and change from Mr. Drexel's Institute of Art, Science and Industry, the University remains faithful to his vision. Its greatly expanded enrollment, campus and curriculum reflect a history of responsiveness to societal and individual needs, which Mr. Drexel sought to address in his day.

Originally a non-degree-granting institution, Drexel began conferring the bachelor of science degree in 1914, when its 18 departments were organized into four schools. In 1927, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania granted Drexel the privilege to confer the master of science degree, and in 1965, the doctor of philosophy degree.

Along with its degree offerings, the institution's curriculum and organization of academic programs have developed, evolving to include 10 colleges and four schools. In accord with this evolution, Drexel has undergone two changes in name, in 1936 becoming Drexel Institute of Technology and in 1970, Drexel University. The current

name reflects the institution's commitment to research, as well as the breadth of its graduate programs.

Despite the many changes during its first century, Drexel's identity has held constant. Since its founding, the institution has remained a privately controlled, non-sectarian, coeducational center of higher learning, distinguished by a commitment to preparing men and women for success in their chosen careers.

The cornerstone of the career preparation Drexel provides has been the University's co-operative education program. Introduced at Drexel in 1919, the program has become integral to the University's educational experience. Through it, students alternate periods of study with periods of full-time professional employment related to their academic and career interests.

Drexel's co-operative education program was among the first in the nation, and today it is one of the largest and most diverse. Through co-op, Drexel students are currently employed by approximately 1,300 companies in 30 states and 24 international locations.

In addition to its career focus, another constant element in Drexel's identity has been its commitment to providing technological expertise for society's needs. This commitment kept the institution operating around the clock during World War II to serve more than 3,000 visiting participants in the Engineering Defense Training Program. Following the war, rapid expansion of knowledge and the nation's drive for technological preeminence continued to be a source of growth for the University.

In 1983, Drexel became the nation's first university to require all undergraduates to have personal access to a microcomputer for use in all of their coursework. In the years since, computer and online technology have become an integral part of instruction throughout the University's curriculum. In 2000, Drexel became the first university to have a fully wireless campus, and in 2002 Drexel rolled out the first web portal for handheld devices to access university information and services.

Today, Drexel continues to build upon strengths in the fields of science and engineering, preparing professionals for leadership in the global technological community through studies in a broad range of disciplines.

New schools were established in 1997 to provide specialized studies: the School of Education, now part of Goodwin College, and the School of Biomedical Engineering, Science and Health Systems. All of the University's academic programs enjoy the highest level of accreditation appropriate to their respective disciplines.

In April 2002, Drexel's mission, services and opportunities expanded further when MCP Hahnemann University, a major Philadelphia health sciences institution, became Drexel University College of Medicine, College of Nursing and Health Professions and School of Public Health. This historic event extended the resources of Drexel and led to many productive synergies in teaching and research.

In 2006, Drexel became the first major research university to open a new law school in 25 years. The Earle Mack School of Law is one of only two law schools to follow a co-operative model.

Drexel University enrolls more than 23,500 fulland part-time students in programs leading to associate's, bachelor's, master's, doctoral and professional degrees (including M.D. and J.D.) in the Colleges of Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Information Science and Technology (the iSchool at Drexel), and Nursing and Health Professions; the Schools of Public Health and Biomedical Engineering, Science and Health Systems; and the Bennett S. LeBow College of Business, Pennoni Honors College, Earle Mack School of Law, Antoinette Westphal College of Media Arts & Design, Drexel University College of Medicine and Richard C. Goodwin College (including the School of Education and the School of Technology and Professional Studies). The University's record of success to date promises an auspicious future and testifies to the genius of Anthony J. Drexel's vision, which has shaped the growth of the institution since its inception.



DREXEL FIRSTS

- ★ Established in 1919, Drexel's co-operative education program is one of the oldest, largest, and most successful. Approximately 1,300 companies in 30 states and 24 international locations participate in the program.
- ★ In 1983, Drexel became the first university to require all students to have microcomputers.
- ★ In 2000, Drexel became the first major university to implement a fully wireless campus.
- ★ In 2002, the University launched DrexelOne Mobile, the first wireless Web portal service for students, followed in 2011 by the DrexelOne Mobile app, the first university smartphone portal available for five smartphone platforms.
- ★ In 2005, Drexel was among the first in the nation to distribute free iPods to incoming freshmen in the School of Education to explore new ways of integrating the latest technologies into teaching.

- ★ Founded in 1850, the Female Medical College of Pennsylvania (later Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania and Medical College of Pennsylvania and now Drexel University College of Medicine) was the first medical school for women in the world.
- ★ The Drexel University College of Medicine has the nation's largest private medical school enrollment.
- ★ Drexel became the first major research university to open a new law school in 25 years with the founding of the Earle Mack School of Law in 2006, and Drexel has one of only two law schools in the nation that follow a co-operative education model.
- ★ The College of Nursing and Health Professions was the first in Pennsylvania to offer a co-operative education program for nursing students.

- ★ The School of Public Health is the only fully accredited public health school in Philadelphia, and one of only two in Pennsylvania.
- ★ The Math Forum@Drexel is the Internet's leading mathematics learning community and was ranked by Scientific American as one the top five sites for mathematics in its annual Sci/Tech Web Site Awards.
- ★ Athletics has eight NCAA Division I sports for men and eight for women, making Drexel one of the few colleges or universities in the nation that enjoys total parity between men's and women's athletics. As a result, Drexel was named No. 1 in the nation for athletic gender equity by U.S. News & World Report.
- ★ Drexel is a pioneer in e-Learning, offering degrees online since 1996 including the first fully online master's degree.
- ★ Drexel's College of Engineering has the largest number of undergraduates in the United States.

DREXEL RANKINGS

For eight consecutive years, Drexel has been ranked in the category of Best National Universities in "America's Best Colleges" by *U.S. News & World Report*. The University placed 86th overall in the 2011 rankings, a jump of two places from 2010 and the third straight time Drexel has been in the top 100.

Drexel also ranked second among national universities in the *U.S. News* list of "Up-and-Comers," those schools most often cited by university administrators nationwide as making "the most promising and innovative changes in the areas of academics, faculty, student life, campus, or facilities." Drexel has been in the top 10 each of the three years this list has been published.

Drexel and the University of Pennsylvania are the only Philadelphia universities ranked in the top 100 by *U.S. News*, joined by Carnegie Mellon, Lehigh, Penn State and the University of Pittsburgh across Pennsylvania.

In a recent Times Higher Education ranking Drexel ranked among the top 200 universities in the world and 76th among the top universities in North America.
